Dear Friends,

It is a pleasure for both James and I to write the Introduction to the Spring 2024 edition of Grapevine. As you can see from the front page our theme is Celebrating our District, and speaking personally to celebrate with great thankfulness the last 10 years when East Anglia has been led by the Revd Dr Julian Pursehouse.

Also it was the intention that Julian himself would write this piece upon his return from Zimbabwe (you will see within Grapevine that we have been able to include many photographs and a brief detail of the trip - hot off the press!). However Julian, along with Deniz, Elaine & Nick were unable to board the flight scheduled for home on the 19th April, due to torrential rain. This time of year is usually the end of the season of rain down in Africa, which is a blessing for Zimbabwe. However the weather in Zimbabwe was perfect, and it was the extremely unlikely events in the Gulf, which meant the cancellation of the plane to Dubai. As we write our prayers are with our four members of the team as they are making alternative plans to come back home.

However this has given the Deputy Chairs the unexpected pleasure of being able to express their personal thanks for Julian's ministry. I have appreciated Julian in so many ways including his deep spirituality, his prayerfulness, thoughtfulness and wisdom; and his kind and encouraging words when we have needed them the most. He has encouraged me to reflect and pray more deeply and to see God in a fresh way through art and poetry. His letters written to us during the Covid-19 Pandemic provided much comfort, encouragement and strength, when many of us were feeling isolated and greatly concerned for the direction of the world and for the church.

Julian's humanity, integrity, spirituality, faith and ability to be an effective bridge from the Local Church to Connexion. His depth of care, commitment to individuals, willingness to tirelessly travel the length and breadth of the District, give of himself in diverse situations, draw out the best in others, keep the focus centred on God and inhabit discipleship with fresh creativity are among the qualities I treasure in Julian. His gentle wise counsel, steadfast presence and support of 'out of the box' thinking have blessed many contexts within our District.

Julian's tenure certainly has been one of partnership and prayer. As he travels onward we know God will continue to bless His Church through Julian's ministry. Our love, prayers and thanks go with you Julian. Thank you for sharing your gifts and graces with us and humbly receiving the same from others.

Southwold Methodist Church - Community Foodbank

The Methodist Church in Southwold closed in March 2022. I arrived as the Superintendent of the Lowestoft & East Suffolk Methodist Circuit in September 2022. I have responsibility for 8 Methodist churches in the circuit, but I was asked to come to see if I could plant a church in Southwold.

The Hunky Dory Vintage Shop began using the church hall in May 2022 and I started going along to tidy up the rest of the building and to sit and think and pray shortly after I arrived. With a

team of helpers from St.

Edmund's CofE (Southwold) church, I decorated the back room and furnished it with Salvation Army furniture. My initial thoughts were for a Soft Play Centre in the church, as soon as I can get the pews removed and the equipment bought.

I considered a Cafe or Tea Shop and then, after spending time at our Foodbank in Hungate church in Beccles, I realised that what was needed was a Foodbank. This idea was treated with a great deal of scepticism. I was told that Southwold is a wealthy place and there are no people in need here. Even Trussell Trust were reluctant to get involved at first. But I persisted and on the 7th November 2023 I opened the Foodbank with my wife as my only

helper. We were given a supply of food from Lowestoft Foodbank's warehouse and no one came for the first two weeks. We now have 8 volunteers and we are never alone - and we get through a lot of food.

Various council departments have given us funding: the Lib Dems gave us a £2,000 grant, and others are supplying us with equipment to help us to feed those "non-existent people" in Southwold, Reydon, Wangford, Wrentham and Walberswick who need help. The Financial Inclusion Team come in to offer advice, along with Christians Against Poverty (CAP). Sole Bay Care Trust have given us £2,000 to provide "food-in-a-bag" so

that we can provide ingredients and recipes for people to make healthy meals. We do this monthly at the moment, but may increase the frequency over time.

The East Suffolk Communities Team gave us 6 new microwaves to give to those who needed them, and we are awaiting Air Fryers and Slow Cookers from them. They are also getting us an industrial freezer for our kitchen. The local Conservative councillor is buying us a dishwasher. The Hygiene Bank keeps us supplied with all those essentials that people can't afford. The East Suffolk Food Network Officer comes in to help with nutrition issues.

At present we are feeding approximately 60 adults and 25-30 children and during the winter we are providing a warm space for people to come into and get warm and sit and talk to old friends and new. We also provide warm clothes.

We have a community of regulars who feel at home here and those who pop in from time to time. The long term plans involve making the church building into a Christian Community Centre with a Cafe and that Soft Play Area that I originally planned. And all this makes me think of Matthew 25: 34-40.

Kirton Garden Cafe


Following COVID we have been opening up our chapel garden in Kirton for 10 weeks in the summer for refreshments, chatter, fellowship, music and play areas for children. We have many willing volunteers and increasing numbers of visitors, including cyclists, dog walkers and folk from near and far enjoying

each other's company.

invited to give a donation towards church funds and the local Basic Life Charity. After thirty sessions, over £6,000 has been donated which has been split 50/50 between the church and Basic Life Charity. Each week a band of willing volunteers make cakes, serve refreshments and give a warm welcome to all attending. People are so grateful for the

opportunity to share each other's company and enjoy the music, which lasts about 45 minutes. The next season starts on 7 January 2025!

Once a month (19:30 to 22:00 every second Thursday) we run a folk Café. We serve refreshments and welcome both folkies and listeners. Come and join us! You can sing, recite poetry, play a tune, join in with the others or just enjoy being in the audience.

It's wonderful that people who have come to these events are now helping and coming to some of our other activities.

We have a Climate Justice Group which is annually invited to spend a day at Felixstowe School, helping with their enrichment day for Year 7 pupils, working with them in their garden.

Every Saturday in all weathers, during the football season, a group of willing volunteers from the church support the Trimley Red Devils by serving bacon and sausage baps to the spectators. This is hugely appreciated with lots of conversations while serving.

We continue to go into local primary schools on a monthly basis to take part in their Assembly with 'Open the Book'. It is a real privilege to share some Bible

stories in this way and the teachers and children are always so welcoming.

Some of the children help to act out the stories, and are extremely enthusiastic.

The team were also invited into the Trimley pre-school to share the Christmas and Easter stories.

The Warm Hub at Toft

his is the second winter that the church in Toft, Cambridgeshire, has hosted a Warm Hub for the village. Toft is a community of about 600 people 7 miles outside Cambridge. The Methodists and Anglicans joined together 20 years ago

to form a Local

Ecumenical Partnership and have the advantage of two buildings, so the Hub has been running in the Methodist chapel with its large kitchen and efficient heating.

The Hub was established, in the face of people's rapidly rising heating bills, as a Christian service we could offer to residents. But we soon realised that it

also addresses other social needs in winter time, particularly but not exclusively of the elderly, those widowed and for older men feeling isolated and lonely even in a place they have called home for many years. It was perhaps for these reasons, and much to the volunteers' surprise, that the Hub became an instant success.



Up to 40 people every Monday morning, for many months, have crowded in, all greeted warmly by name at the door and looked after with affection by a 'welcomer' as they find their seat. What we offer is friendship and warmth in every

sense of the word. The rest is very simple – free hot and cold drinks, biscuits and cake served at long tables where jigsaws, Scrabble and art materials provide endless entertainment. Thousand piece puzzles have been proudly completed, creative Christmas and Easter decorations



crafted and serious games of high score word making won. Our Methodist and Anglican clergy, all great

cake eaters, have been regular attenders, joining in the general hubbub as tea servers and good listeners.

The key to everything has been the many conversations that keep the room buzzing. From tales of the past in Toft, to theological

debate, the swapping of ailments and treatments, family and village news, and even to local politics, people just want to have a good chat, set the world to rights and to get to know each

other better. The atmosphere is one of kindness and humour; everyone is simply pleased to see their neighbours

> and anyone who wanders in, and to enjoy the day. It's one of the best things we've initiated as a church, part of our mission and commitment to our community and a way for us to embody the Gospel in our place – a 'warm hub' indeed!





With such a large area it was certainly a huge challenge, and looking back I don't think I have covered the District as I had hoped at the beginning. The appointment has certainly opened doors for me to spread the word, from small church weeknight meetings to the larger involvement of leading the time of reflection at the civic service when I was a District Councillor and the prayers at Bury Cathedral Harvest thanksgiving services.

some wonderful people, who I have been aware have been praying for us for the last two years especially.

of tractors stuck even on lighter land, it is certainly a difficult time. I have always tried to convince myself that things will come good again and they usually do, but with so many areas of land under water for so long I doubt the

sown crop will survive. Already I have heard of some re-drilling.

Keep praying that the wars will end and some sort of normality will return.

Thank you to everyone for your support since 2000.

I am hoping a person can be found to replace me, because there is a real need to listen to the farming personnel. The hymn at my commissioning service was 'Will you come and follow me if I but call your name' - will you??

he Methodist Church adopted the report "A Justice-seeking Church" in 2023. This includes a section on learning from British Methodist history:


- A commitment to the poorest –
 John Wesley encouraged work with
 those experiencing poverty
- Building relationships the rich were encouraged to spend time with the poor
- Leadership from the margins –
 being a child of God gives
 individuals a true sense of value,
 however society may judge them
- Liberation for all from drink, from slavery
- Prophetic witness –
 Methodism has a
 tradition of
 nurturing
 prophetic groups
 and individuals
 who have
 challenged
 injustice within
 Church and society
- Recognising and learning from our Church's part in injustices – we have begun to acknowledge our

acknowledge our failings as a Church where we have got it very

wrong (and hurt people)
The report agreed five Priorities for
Justice as a focus for the Church's
action over the following five years:

- Tackling inequality and poverty seeking life in all its fullness
- 2. Enabling a flourishing environment– right relationship betweenpeople, planet and God
- Seeking justice for refugees one people, one world
- 4. Opposing discrimination all are made in the image of God
- 5. Pursuing peace seeking justice and reconciliation

At the Autumn
Representative Synod we broke into small groups to consider these. In this article I would like to celebrate what is already being done by the Churches across our District. This probably only reflects a small part of what is actually being done. Let us "celebrate" and say thanks for:

- EDI training raising awareness of potential discrimination
- Support for CAP (Christians Against Poverty)
- Meetings on climate change leading to Council action
- Eco-church initiatives
- Social justice groups
- Recognising the inequality in our communities (hopefully leading to action)
- Support given to those with mental health issues
- Beach cleans and community litter -picking
- Befriending illegal immigrants and limited work with refugees
- Pride events
- Sports passes/sports ministry
- Providing clothing and shoes
- Racism awareness conversations
- Providing accessible resources e.g. large print or Braille hymn books, loop system
- Peace garden (space for thinking and prayer), community gardens, Vegetable Bank and Renew Wellbeing Café
- Challenging discrimination when we see it
- Response to emergency appeals

We also discussed what we might do differently and that would be for another article!

For now "Give thanks with a grateful heart" for all that is being done. Hopefully the above list may give you some ideas of what your Church might do. You may need to lay down something first, or work with others, so as not to be overburdened. We can learn from each other (successes and failures). Remember to underpin everything with prayer. Pray 2-3 Feedback to Celebrate

ray 2-3 has highlighted the prayer life of myself and my church, Kessingland.

I guess it really kicked in for us when we were asked by someone on zoom during a service to pray for her mother who was live on zoom with her and likely to die before the end of the service. She actually lived for a

few more weeks but her daughter appreciated our input.

We then placed a prayer tree in the church, and anyone coming was invited to place a prayer/request on the tree. Red leaves for prayer needs and yellow for thank you's.

One member asked for prayers for a work colleague who was 5 months pregnant and had gone into labour. We held her in prayer for the next 3 months and sent one of our "Praying for you" cards to her. She gave birth at 8 months to a tiny baby who survived. Just before Christmas she turned up at church, saying I am not a church goer, but I know you have been praying for us and wanted to say thank you. She brought



her baby with her and another child!

At Christmas that baby was our "Baby Jesus" at the crib service. She has subsequently been to church bringing her children with her. This has prompted us to have Family services monthly, and to plan a messy church morning.



Another person who had just been released from prison was sent a "Praying for you" card which he sent a thank you for and says it is propped up in his room so he can see it.

The Christmas prayer cards were given out in our local foodbank and many have said thank you for them. A few have attended Christmas services in the area (that I know of). The cards have

been conversation openers for quite a few clients.

The year has certainly created a new enthusiasm for mission in the church and the village.

As our giraffe is based on stained glass windows which emit light and tell stories, our theme is 'let love shine out'.



A visit to Mt Sinai Church in the Budiriro Circuit for worship that was filled with so much praise and joy and then at Mabelreign Methodist Church (which is twinned with The Norfolk Broads Circuit).

A visit to Sandringham Methodist School in the company of Bishop Lynsey and Dignity, the Synod Secretary.













A great day meeting the General Secretary and Presiding Bishop of Zimbabwe Methodist Church, followed by a visit to a Darwendale Circuit, in Mashonaland West Province, where we met the local Superintendent and Circuit Stewards. The Shelter is a temporary structure that serves as the local church, where a congregation of thirty people bring their seats and meet on a Sunday for Worship.











A visit to rural Chivhu Circuit for a great worship and welcome, sharing in food, dance, laughter and fellowship. There is only one manse in Chevu and one serviceable vehicle, and a staff team of three presbyters. We talked about the challenges of rural ministry and left feeling humbled by the resilience of the

A number of challenging issues face the church in Zimbabwe, such as conditions of drought and failed crops, economic pressures upon rural circuits, and clergy welfare.
